LINCOLN, Sept. 24.-(Special.)-George Weidenfeld of the board of commissioners state institutions is working out a tories, as he relieved Engel with the bases system of accounting with respect to the several institutions over which the board has charge, which it is hoped may be the basis for future expenditures.

Before, however, th abov plan can be nade a effective, Georg Widenfld holds that the present method of making appropriations will necessarily have to be modified.

At present each institution is allowed a specific sum for many varied purposes. Anti-Suffrage Meeting.

Declaring that state wheree women did not vote had laws which protected the female wage earner better then the states which had equal suffrage, Miss Lucy Price of Cleveland, O., speaking in opposition to woman suffrage, addressed large audience last night which filled the large convention hall at the Lindell hotel. Mrs. J. W. Crumpacker of Omaha was the first speaker, both women being introduced by Colonel John G. Maher.

Miss Price said generally thee claim was made that if woman voted it would mean prohibition, but she denied that the cause had been helped in states where woman voted. She said that nine states were prohibition, but every one of them were made so by the votes of men. There are ten suffrag states and not one of them except Kansas has prohibition and that was made dry by the men long before the right was given to women to
