MRS. KATHERINE WAUGH McCULLOCH of Evanston, Ill., one of the most prominent women in the vicinity of Chicago, offers her services for the Nebraska suffrage campaign, in a letter received by Mrs. Draper Smith Saturday. The date of her Omaha appearance has not yet been set. Mrs. McCulloch is a member of the faculty of the Chicago College of Law, occupying the chair of "domestic relations," a position which was created especially for her nearly two years ago. She is associated with her husband in the practice of law and has served as justice of the peace in Evanston.

Following the passage of the Illinois suffrage bill, Mrs. McCulloch inaugurated a class in civics and current events for women, which meets every Sunday afternoon in the large First Congregational church at Evanston. She has written plays, pamphlets and other articles for use in the suffrage campaign states. Mrs. McCulloch was chairman of the legislative committee of the Illinois Suffrage association and was of invaluable assistance in the campaign there. She has always been an active club woman and finds time to do all these things, even though she is the mother of four children, her eldest son being a graduate of this year's class at Northwestern university.

Miss Anna Peterson of the Omaha High school faculty, is very well acquainted with Mrs. McCulloch, having met her while on a visit to her sister, Mrs. Franklin Keese Jackson, in Evanston.

Dean Fordyce of the University of Nebraska will lecture on "Vocational Training in the Public Schools" before the South Omaha Woman's club at Library hall, Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. This is the opening meeting of the year for the club. Following the lecture, interest will be re-awakened in the proposition to serve hot lunches in the public schools. Mrs. N. M. Graham, president of the club, will read a paper on the subject, and Miss Jessie Stitt, principal of the West Side school, in which school the experiment will be tried out in about two weeks, will also give a talk boosting the idea. Musical numbers will be given.

The Needlework Guild of America will hold a preliminary meeting at the home of Mrs. W. A. Smith, 14 South Thirty-ninth street, Tuesday afternoon. Over 2,500 garments were distributed last year to needy families and institutions by this organization, which has been sewing for charity for the last twenty years. Mrs. J. J. Anti-suffrage colors, literature, buttons and American beauty flowers, emblem of the anti-suffragists, will be distributed and there will be speeches every Sunday afternoon and evening. Miss Marjorie Dorman of New York City, and Mrs. J. W. Crumpacker will speak on the opening day Monday.

In the afternoon and Mrs. Crumpacker and Miss Lucy Price, newspaper woman from Cleveland, in the evening. Miss Price's talk will deal with the high cost of living and the part woman has to play in solving its problems.

There is no fee for either of the classes except the \$1 membership fee for one year. General opening of these classes October 12. Registrations are coming in rapidly.

Classes in domestic science are necessarily limited in number. Those entering the gymnasium should be making arrangements for physical examinations and for ordering suits. October 5 will be the first fall party. This is a "get-together party" gymnasium girls will be on the gym floor in suits for a trade.
