FRED CLARKE'S LAST SEASON

Famous Leader of the Buccaneers Serving His Last Base Ball Term.

STARTED GAME AT HASTINGS

Was Nineteen Years of Age Then, Back in Eighteen Hundred and Ninety-Two, and Has Been at It Ever Since.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—When the National league pennant race of 1915 gets under way a field leader who has seen more continuous service as a manager in its ranks than any other leader now in the game will be among the missing. From official circles in Pittsburgh comes the news that Fred Clarke is now serving his last campaign as the head of the Buccaneers and another man will be in charge before next season rolls around.

Noteworthy Career.

Clarke's managerial career has been a noteworthy one. For fourteen successive years his team was a pennant contender, never finishing outside the first division. In 1904 he was fourth and he reached the same position last season. In twelve campaigns he finished third or better. In the campaigns of 1907, 1908 and 1909 Clarke led his team to the National league championship and in 1908 he repeated. In 1908 and 1909 the Pirates were world's champions, defeating Boston and Detroit, respectively. In 1908 he fell one game short of the championship, being the Giants for second place after the Cubs had won the memorable play-off game which put the Giants one game out of first place.
