Rockefeller Board Will Investigate Industrial Affairs

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—The Rockefeller foundation announced today that it had authorized to make a far-reaching investigation of industrial conditions in this country, and that it had retained the services of W. L. MacKenzie King, former minister of labor in Canada, as director of the investigation. The announcement was made in a statement issued here by Jerome D. Green, secretary of the Rockefeller foundation. "In spirit and method the investigation of the problem of industrial relations will be like that carried on by the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research," the statement says, "and other inquiries instituted by the Rockefeller boards."

Part of Villa's Army Refuses to Follow Him in His Revolt

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 1.—Further definite reports of divisions in Villa's army reached the border today from both official and impartial sources. The report that General Monclovia Herrera, with his entire brigade, had revolted against Villa's authority was confirmed. It also was reported that the Arieta brothers, leaders in Durango, had revolted to the Carranza side, and that Villa's leader, Tomas Urbina, had taken Durango City after a battle. Luis Aguirre Benavides, secretary to General Villa, under date of September 30, telegraphed the Associated press that an armistice had been declared through Mexico with Aguas Calientes as a neutral zone. He stated also that elections would be held according to the first agreement from October 5 to 10.

AGUAS CAIENTES, Mex., Oct. 1.—Definite agreement to cease all troop movements immediately, and to call the greatest possible number of constitutionalist chiefs together here on October 5, preparatory to a general convention October 10, was agreed upon yesterday at the first conference between Villa and the Carranza peace commissioners.

Customs Receipts Shrink One-Third

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Receipts yesterday from duties paid at the custom house were \$24,014, of which \$20,544 was for recent importations. There was a falling off of \$4,246,934 in the receipts of this September as compared with last September, when the total receipts from duties were \$13,305,284. The total receipts for the month ended yesterday were \$12,118,550.

CANNON FACTORIES OF ITALY WORK DAY AND NIGHT

ROME (Via Paris), Oct. 1.—Factories where guns are being made are working night and day to finish the supply of modern cannon which have been ordered for the Italian army. The firms hope to be able to hasten the work to such an extent that the whole army will be provided with these cannon in a few weeks. An order has been issued to hasten the preparation of the supply of provisions and ammunition for the troops.

Austrians March East.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—A message from Maastricht according to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam, says that 5,000 Austrian troops have arrived at Aix la Chapelle from France on the way to the Austro-Russian front.

REBLIN REPORTS RUSSIANS ROUTED

Czar's Army Trying to Break Through Into Hungary Repulsed Everywhere.

RETREATING IN SILESIA AS WELL

No Official News from Western Battleground Since Day Before Received in the German Capital.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—An official announcement in Berlin and received here through the Marconi Wireless company follows: "The Russians in trying to cross the Carpathians in strong columns and break through into Hungary have been repulsed everywhere. As these troops are operating a great distance from the main theater of war, their maneuvers are unimportant, but it is intended to create disquiet among the Hungarian population, it has been entirely frustrated."

Enemy Retreats.

"As the result of new operations commenced by the united German-Austro-Hungarian forces the enemy on both sides of Weichsel (in Silesia, on the Vistula) has retreated. Strong bodies of Russian cavalry have been dispersed near Bilecz (Galicia), while to the north of Weichsel several divisions of the enemy's cavalry have been driven in front of the German army."

No Official News from West.

BERLIN, Sept. 30 (Via London).—No official news from the western battle ground has been received here since last night. Newspapers have not been informed by their correspondents regarding the great general engagement which is progressing and the details are not known here.

Archduke Frederick, commander-in-chief of the Austrian forces, declared that a new and great victory was imminent in the western camp of the Germans, according to dispatches received here from Vienna.

Borah Says Clayton Bill is a Reversal of Sherman Law

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The fight on the Clayton trust bill conference report was continued today with Senator Borah leading the attack. He contended the democratic anti-trust program was a reversal of strict statutory prohibition of monopoly as expressed in the Sherman law, and was a step toward regulating monopolies and restraints by commissions.

Senator Weeks also opposed the report. He made a long elaborate defense of the United Shoe Machinery company, discussing at length "the tying clause" in the leases under which the corporation rents machinery to shoe manufacturers. Senator Reed, who leads the fight on the report, read into the record the "tying clause," which gives the company the right to cancel the lease if a manufacturer installs machinery made by any other. By questioning Senator Weeks he brought out that Louis D. Brandeis, who was consulted in framing the Clayton bill, was an attorney in the organization of the United Shoe Machinery company and drew the original "tying clause" lease.

In 1906, Senator Weeks said, Mr. Brandeis opposed bills before the Massachusetts legislature designed to prevent the "tying clause" contracts and afterward was legal adviser of the company in efforts to alter the form of the "tying clause" to avoid the provision.

Foodstuffs Bound For Holland Ports Considered Neutral

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The British government today, through Ambassador Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, notified the State department that Great Britain would not interfere with shipments of food stuffs from the United States to Holland.

Great Britain also has agreed to release any seized cargoes as soon as it is established that their destination is Holland. It is understood that Great Britain has impressed on Holland that according to its duties as a neutral state it must not permit foodstuffs or other cargoes destined to the German army to pass its borders. The practical effect of the arrangements is expected to be that foodstuffs may possibly pass into Germany, if it is clearly established that their use is to be confined to civilians, as in notifying the United States of its action the British stipulated no restrictions on destinations.

The understanding, however, applies only to the status of shipments in transit between the United States and Holland or any other neutral country. Announcement of the exemption of American foodstuffs from seizure or diversion is considered only one step toward the solution of the whole difficult question under the new regulations in the declaration of London.

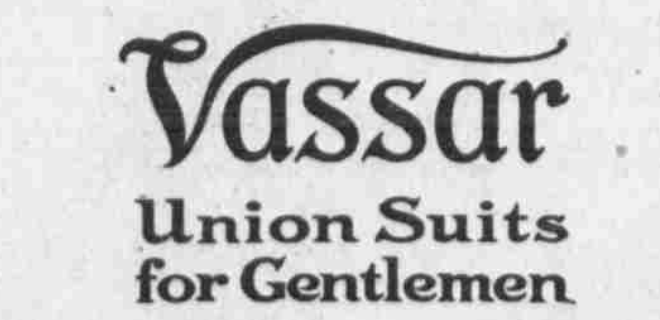
President Wilson today told callers that the British government has been most friendly in its attitude on shipments of possible unneutral character in American vessels and has shown a willingness to discuss the question. He declared he had no doubt that a satisfactory arrangement would be reached.
