MOUNT MACHINE GUNS IN ANTWERP CHURCH TOWERS

LONDON, Oct. 3.—The following official statement has been received from Berlin by wireless:

"Russian prisoners at Crossen, Prussia, attempted to escape during a thunderstorm. The sentries opened fire, however, and three Russians were killed, eight severely injured and several slightly hurt."

"It is reported from different sources that the Belgians already have placed machine guns in church towers of Antwerp. The siege of that city is making progress."

Rev. L. B. Holsapple to Assume Duties as Pastor of St. Barnabas.

PROTESTANTS AT ALL SAINTS. Peace Prayers Will Be Said in the Churches of Omaha in Accordance with President Wilson's Proclamation.

Peace Day will be observed by the Rotary club members and their wives, who will attend the 11 o'clock service at All Saints' church Sunday, Rector Thomas J. Mackay being a member of the club.

The apostolic missionaries, Father Monahan and O'Mahony of Parkers, S. D., will open a mission Sunday at Holy Family church, Eighteenth and Cuming streets. The mission will open with solemn high mass at 11 o'clock, at which parishioners have been earnestly requested to be present, as all announcements relative to the mission will be made at this mass.

Owing to car service people of neighboring parishes will likely take this opportunity of making a retreat. The church has a large seating capacity and can accommodate many. The choir, under the leadership of R. Y. Kersey, director, and Miss Emma Gentileman, organist, will give special music.

Rev. L. B. Holsapple, who will succeed Father John Williams as pastor of St. Barnabas' Episcopal church, Nineteenth and California streets, will assume his new duties Sunday morning. Bishop Arthur L. Williams will be present and officiate at the installation.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Omaha Church Federation a call was issued upon all Protestant

churches to have a special hour of prayer for world peace either just before or after the regular morning worship.

In accordance with President Wilson's proclamation setting aside Sunday as a day upon which all Americans should unite in common prayer for the restoration of peace in Europe and over the entire world, practically all Omaha churches will today hold pertinent services, each in its own particular way, but for the same end.

This will be the only general public meeting in observance of Peace Day. William Baird, recently back from the war zone of Europe, will speak.
