

HUSKERS BARELY WHIP WASHBURN

Costly Fumbling by Backfield at Crucial Moments Ruin Ne braska's Chances to Score.

OLD-STYLE PLAY ONLY USED

Attempts at Forward Pass Flunk and Cornhuskers Depend on Closed Advances by Hal-Hgan and Others.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 3,-(Special Telegram.)-The Nebraska Cornhuskers won the opening game of the season from Washburn college, 14 to 7, but the Cornhuskers of 1914 bere little resemblance to Stiehm's powerful machine of last year It was an exceedingly ragged exhibition which the Cornbusgers staged.

Firmbling continually, but especially at critical times, when scores were in sight. cost the Huskers at least three touchdowns. The entire backfield shared in the fumbling, but Chamberlain was the particular offender. Howard alone showed up with customary steadiness, and his work in running back punts was excel-

Washburn's backfield was also guilty of frequent fumbling, marring the game from the spectators' standpoint.

Beales Furnishes Thrills. Little Beales, the speedy little left half for Washburn, provided the thriller when, with the ball in the center of the field. he circled the Nebraska left end, shook off several tacklers and dodged others, and raced fifty yards for a touchdown. Washburn raised its total to seven points by kicking goal and the score was tied, the Huskers having scored earlier in the second period on a series of line plunges and end runs, with Halligan, Chamberlain and Rutherford lugging the ball for long distances.

Fumble Nets Score,

Washburn virtually gave Nebraska their scond touchdown on a costly fumble on their own seven-yard line. Nebraska reovered the ball and carried it over for the only other touchdown,

Washburn came back with open style play and negotiated several successful forward passes for five to eight yards at a time. Nebraska relied entirely on the old style of play, its two attmpts at forward passes going wild.
