The collection of chrysanthemums will gladden the heart of lovers of this particular winter flower, as careful attention was given to the selection of varicties, seldom seen in the commercial line. In the carnation collection will be shown a number of the best known varieties including famous prize winning plants. All colors are represented, including a famous yellow species.

The hyacinths are of the giant massive variety, not often planted for other than exhibition purposes.

This collection, together with the Joslyn orchid plants, will be shown to visitors at the greenhouses. Commissioner Hummel extends a cordial invitation to the public to visit this collection

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


