Follow Local Prices on Wheat.

LARGE QUANTIES HELD BACK

Wet Weather in Corn Belt Has Tendency to Boost That Commodity to Some Extent on the Local Market.

OMAHA. Oct. 18, 1914.

The question of handlers of cash wheat yesterday was: "Will exporters follow the gain in theprice of this grain?"

The trade in cash wheat yesterday was the smallest in several weeks, with the transactions via gulf ports only, and these were at lower prices. Wheat via the gulf sold at he above December on Tuesday, but yesterday sales were made at he upder that month. This shows that buyers are keeping a close watch on the visible supply, which is now quite large, as well as on the amount of wheat and flour afloat on the ocean, destined to importing countries, as well as on the movement out of the hands of northwestern and southwestern farmers.

The price of wheat showed gains of 16 (2000 yesterday. The market was a local affair mainly with only here and there an olitside order on either the buying or seeling side. One of the larger grain houses at Liverpool, in a cable to a United States concern, says that Liverpool has sufficient wheat for immediate wants, but it has nothing for the future, and that prices are expected to do better for a long pull. There were gains of as much as Id in spot wheat in the big English market and Paris was up lc for wheat yesterday. Those in the wheat trade, not only at Chicago, but in the smaller markets of the country, and who are considered good judges of conditions, are now the larger holders of cash wheat in the belief that the war will be a long drawn out affair and that prices must sell higher. On the buying side of wheat were much stronger concerns than on the selling side.
