WALL STREET CHEERFUL

Easier Tone to Foreign Exchange One of Factors. FLOW OF GOLD TO CANADA Abstract of Reports by National Banks Show They Hold Clearing House Certificates of \$53,000,000. NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Re-opening of the western freight rate case before the Interstate Commerce commission, the excellent condition of the local banks as disclosed by last week's statement, continued progress in the formation of the gold and cotton pools and other factors to foreign exchange, combined to put Wall street in a more cheerful frame of mind today. MUCH DAMAGE DONE BY QUAKE OVER GREECE

PARIS, Oct. 19.—Great damage was done by the earthquake yesterday, the village of Kapsali and Pyri near Thebes, being destroyed, according to a dispatch from Athens. The Grecian province of Boeotia suffered most. Twenty distinct shocks were felt there. The number of casualties is not known. Provisions and tents are being hurried for those who have lost their homes.
