THREE KILLED AS **BANDITS TRAPPED**

Canadian Official and Two Robbers Slain in Battle North of International Border.

ONE, WOUNDED, TAKES OWN LIFE

Gang Believed to Have Looted Bank in Washington Met by Dominion Officials and Gun Fight Follows.

BLAINE, Wash., Oct. 31.-The band of

men who are believed to have robbed the Bank of Sedrowoolley of \$25.00 late Saturday night, and whose progress northward through the sparsely settled parts of Skagita and Whatcom counties has been continuous since the' robbery, fell into a trap three miles north of the international boundary here early this morning and two of their number were killed and a third wounded when a posse intercepted them. A member of the posse was also instantly slain.

The dead CLIFFORD ADAMS, aged 25, Canadian immigration inspector, shot through brain and heart.

Unidentified robber. The robbers, walking north on the Great Northern railroad track, were observed when they passed through Blaine, and word was telephoned to Canadian immigration inspectors at Hazlemuir, B. Adams, Keith and Canadian Immigration Inspector A. E. Burke met the robbers on the track, and Burke ordered them to halt. Instead, the foremost robber drew a pistol. Burke immediately shot the bandit dead. Firing then became general. Adams was killed by the robbers first volley. Three of the surviving robbers took to the woods. The fourth fied down the track and was brought down with a bullet in his thigh. Just before noon a third robber was wounded at Hall's prairie. 
