American Farmer Still Has Clear Road in Exporting Wheat.

ALL GRAINS SOMEWHAT LOWER Speculation in Wheat is Small and Following Its Lead Corn and

Onts Suffer Decline

in Price.

OMAHA, Nov. 14, 1014.

The Yankee farmer continues to have a fairly clear road in the export wheat business. Argentina shipped only 15,000 but this week, merely a handful waen compared with last year. There is now in the visible supply at the chief ports of Argentina 35,000 but of wheat. A cable from Liverpoot, which was probably intended for a club with which to drive the holders of wheat in the United States into line claimed that India would ship more freely and that next weeks outward movement is placed at 50,000 but that country being an English possession, Great britain will pay higher prices for its grain than any other importing nation can alford to pay.

Speculation in wheat is small, yet it matters not whether futures are weak or strong, the cash trade continues on an almost unheard of scale and foreigners are meeting the views of holders, which are generally quite strong, it is believed that the open interest in May wheat at Chicago is above normal, and that foreigners are the largest owners of that month, it was reported that there are 6,000,000 bu, of grain at Buffalo affoat and that this congestion must be relieved before additional amounts can be taken in or the grain moved out.

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Persistent buying on the part of seaboard exporters forced a rally in the wheat market today after an early break. There was a nervous close at 1674c to 1675c under last night, oats with a gain of 16c and provisions varying from unchanged figures to a deciline of 10c.

At first the foreign demand in the wheat trade seemed likely to make little, if any, impression against the unsettling effects of the peace rumors that were circulated yesterday and earlier in the week. Some of the larger firms here, however, received from their own European representatives flat denials that the peace talk had any real basis, and when earlier sellers tried to cover it was found that the accumulated buying for exporters had left the pit bare of any floating supply.

Heaviness, which characterized the early dealings in wheat, was added to by continued large receipts, both northwest and southwest, and by predictions of a large increase of the visible supply total on Monday. Furthermore, reports were at hand that weather conditions were fine for the Argentine harvest, which is expected to begin next week. The bears, one after another, lost their courage, though, and in the last hour were nearly altogether on the defensive.

There was no argency on the buying side of the market, fleid conditions being about all that could be desired for gathering and marketing the crop. Fairly large export transactions upheld oats. Then, too, offerings at the sample tables were noticeably measer.

Provisions ruled irregular throughout, but with a tendency mainly downward, owing to lack of any steady support. Trade as a whole was light.
