Friday morning there will be a presentation of Mrs. Medill McCormick's suffrage "movie" play, "Your Girl and Mine," at the Hipp theater, for the benefit of the delegates to the convention only. Later the play will be put on at one of the larger theaters for a week's run, it which time part of the proceeds will go to suffrage.

All arrangements for the convention are in the hands of the city central suffrage committee, including Mesdames E. M. Fairfield, H. C. Sumney, Myrtle Kelly, Mary Carmack, F. D. Weed and E. A. Fish and Poultry Men Prosper from Shortage of Meat

Due to the enforced scarcity of meats which has resulted from the wide-spread quarantine, fish and poultry brokers are enjoying an unbounded prosperity. The prices of meats have gone up and the average consumer is therefore buying less and on the other hand buying fish and poultry.

Booth & Co., one of Omaha's largest fish companies, has found that its business has increased by leaps and bounds. Plenty of fresh fish is to be had and oysters are plentiful and cheap. Oysters are selling at 30 cents a quart. A quart contains two pounds and as oysters can be prepared in innumerable ways the sale of oysters in Omaha and the shipments out of Omaha are far above the average.

White fish, halibut and catfish are selling in large quantities as they are plentiful in season and are reasonable in price. Chickens have been very cheap all fall and the supply apparently unlimited. As a result of the great demand the price has gone up a bit during the last few days, but it is still very reasonable. Cole-Fry company and the Omaha Cold Storage company are receiving extraordinarily heavy shipments but they are selling to retailers almost as fast as they receive the shipments.

MARKET IN DALLAS ON FEDERAL BUILDING SITE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Assistant Secretary Newton of the treasury today granted permission to the city of Dallas, Texas, to establish a free open market on a federal building site recently bought by the government. Farmers and truck gardeners may place their products on sale without paying fees.
