The banks, railroads, express and telegraph companies were supplied with a large number, sufficient to accommodate their patrons until another \$60,000, which are on the way, arrive.

A new ruling with regard to the war tax has been declared. It is to the effect that all stamps of 10 cents or more de-nomination, in addition to cancellation by initials and date, must be crossed by

three parallel lines.

Another feature of the war tax is that all custom entry blanks must be stamped and cancelled and where imports are stored in warehouses bond must be furnished and that bond stamped and cancelled.
