Over Two Million Refuges Said to Have Crossed Border.

ALL ARE BEING WELL TREATED

Efforts Are Made to Finds John and Means of Existence for Men and Members of Their

Families.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) PARIS. Nov. 30 .- "There are now more than 1,000,000 Belgian refugees France," Monsteur Berardi, secretary of the Franco-Belgian relief committee, has informed the Associated Press.

"France has received them with the greatest consideration and generosity," he said, "the government allowing them the same amount as their own unem ployed-25 cents per day to each head of a family, plus 10 cents for each child. This, of course, is sufficient to keep them from starvation, but nearly all of them have other pressing needs, as they field, in a majority of cases, with insufficient clothing and lacking other necessittles. We are doing all we can, alded by the French government, to solve the pr stricken population in the northern de-




