Increase to the Producers of This State Would Run Into Large Sums if the Bullroads Have Their Way.

Chairman Thorne has estimated that the proposed increase would mean an in-creased revenue to the railroads of \$70,-00,000 drawn from the pockets of the peo-ple in the western states, or in what is thown in rate circles as the western classification territory.

In Nebraska alone it would mean an cornous increase in the amounts paid annually for freight charges. H. O. Taylor of the Nebraska Raliway commission estimates that in the shipment of grain alone in Nebraska the isoranse would amount to \$66,000, as it would average \$5 a car, and the average num-

The proposed increase is to be tacked on to a great many commodities. Pirteen hundred tariffs have been filed by the railroads. They are for an increase on grain, hay, live stock, lumber and a great variety of moods.

Thirty-six railroads are agreed upon the request for this gdvance, besides many agency publications of western trains incommittees, the Bouthwestern Tariff committee, the Transmissouri Preight association, and the Ohio River committee.

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
