Carter Charges Rail Boss with Harassing Witnesses for Men

CHICAGO, Dec. In-Suspicion that the committee of railroad general managers has not been acting in gool faith in the arbitration of wage differences between western railroads and their employee, was voiced before the federal arbitration board today by William E. Carter, presi-dent of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen.

Carter says his suspicion had been increased by the receipt of an anonymous letter, stating that the managers' comrittee had been "feeling around" to find out just what witnesses were to be called for the enginemen,

"You no doubt have observed," said Carter, addressing the board, "embarrassment of most of our witnesses. They feel that every forgotten detail of their records is being dug up, and it af-focts their testimony. I have had difficulty in getting some of them to testify. and some of them on whom I counted have disappeared."

Witnesses today were George Crylle of Salida, Colo., a fireman on the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, and O. F. Modanbach of El Reno, Old., a Rock Island railroad fireman.

Burglar Syndicate, With Headquarters In Chicago, Busy Here

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 .- Another confession penned by a convicted law breaker, was made public today by Maclay Hoyne. state's attorney, who recently caused the indictment of several Chicago police offloers for alleged collusion with law breakers.

According to Hoyne, Isadore Wexier, now serving a term in the penitentiary for hurglary, told of a band of burglars who stole goods valued at more than \$1,000,000 in Chicago and other cities. The prisoner said Chicago was the clearing house for the stolen goods and named four detectives, formerly at the Central police station, who worked with the band. The burglars worked in New York, Boston, Omaha, St. Louis, Minneapolis and Milwaukee, according to Wexler, who eaid Boston and Omaha were the only cities in which they did not receive protection from the police. Wexler also was reported to have said that the band burglarized in Paris to the amount of \$100,000 with the aid of the police there.

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


