According to a leading authority, farmers were looking for higher prices and could see no special incentive to sell any more wheat than was necessary. Numerouscorrespondents in Missouri were quoted as saving that spowers in that state were not selling at all and that Missouri has the smales' farm reserves in twenty years.

Absence of any great export business seemed to be chiefly responsible for the fact that the wheat market underwent a series of backward swings after reaching a new high record. Other dealines too lacked volume, and despite the violent changes in price, trading was conducted with but little appearance of excitement.

Although there was considerable selling of corn as the result of the setback in wheat, the buying power was amply sufficient to absorb the offerings. Exporters were said to be actively buying corn at the seaboard as well as here and in Omaha. There was strong evidence of foreign buying of oats. Estimates on the Argentine exportable surplus of oats were reduced.

Provisions at first declined to sympthy with a break in hog values. Later, however, the tendency was upward owing to the strength of corn.

Allies Gain Ground at Every Point Along Western Line Except One.

GERMANS WIN AT SOISSONS

PARIS, Jan. 21 .- (2:57 p. m.) - There was given out this afternoon an official statement under the caption, "The war from November 15 to January 15," reading as a

"Since November 15, in other words, since the conclusion of the battle of Ypres and up to the complete resumbtion of the great German offensive movement against our left wing, the war has taken the character of a siege. In such a warfare it generally is expected that the advantages obtained by one side or the other virtually offset each other. But in this case it can be said that, with one exception, we alone have gained ground. With this one exception the Germans everywhere have gone back.

Gains and Losses. The following recital of points gained makes it possible to get an idea of the

"By the Germans-Destruction of the market, of the cathedral and of the hospital at Ypres; destruction of the town of Nieuport and of the Nieuport baths and the bembardment of Armentierer, Bethune and Arras; bombardment of Soupir and of Soissons; recapture of Hill No. 132 and of an eminence near Crouy. and a gain of from 1,200 to 1,800 yards to the north of Solssons; advance of 300 metres in the Argonne along a front of 800 metres at a point near the Brock des Muriesons: bombardment of a church at Nancy and of the hospital at Thann.

To complete it it should be added that, first, the German offensive in Poland has been restrained for a month past; second, the Russian offensive continues in Galicia and in the Carpathian mountains; third, the Turkish army in the Caucasus has been in large measure annihilated: fourth, Germany has exhausted its resources in officers (an average of twelve officers to a regiment), and will not in the future be able to develop its resources in effective men except at the expense of the existing units; fifth, the armies of the allies, on the contrary, are finding it possible to further strengthen themselves to a mous urable degree.

"It can consequently be affirmed that to obtain final victory it is sufficient 19 100 to obtain final victory it is sufficient of that France and its allies know how to so to set a wait for it, and at the same time prepare for it with inexhaustible patience.
