CORN PRICES FAIL TO HOLD

Cash wheat was from 1562 lower today. The purchases of foreigners were not much greater, while the offerings were larger. One lot of 100,000 bushels No. 2 hard winter wheat was sold to go abroad at May price for late March shipment. The Updike concern reported sales of the crop. As viewed from an impartial standpoint, and taking into consideration the cash trade and other circumstances surrounding the market, the situation appears legitimate. Sales of cash wheat at the seaboard totalled \$00,000 hushels and Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas City reported good sales of cash wheat.

Exports of breadstuffs from the United States Guring December, with flour and wheat included, were \$7,000,000 hushels, compared with \$500,000 bushels for the same period last year.

Corn was higher, but the best prices of the day failed to hold. Cash sales were \$6,000 bushels corn and \$25,000 bushels oats. The seaboard reported 300,000 bushels oats for foreign shipment.
