Prominent Shares Move Within Extremely Narrow Limits

TRADING IS SLOW IN LONDON

NEW YORK. Jan. E.—Prominent stocks moved within extremely narrow limits during today's dull and irregular session. Canadian shares Erie first preferred, Western Maryland and the southern group of railroads were up from 1 to almost 2 points, as were a few specialities like American Sugar, Heet Sugar, Western Union, Westinghouse and Pittsburgh Coal preferred. Sears-Roebuck advances 6 points.

The rise in the shares of the cotton roads was the more inexplicable from the fact that the Southern railway reported unfavorable earnings for December, operating revenues falling off over K.100.000, with a net loss of \$24,000. Union Pacific by reduring its expenses, showed a small net gain, while Atchison, regardless of increased expenses, made a net gain of \$40,000.
