NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—All recent calculations and estimates dealing with financial and industrial conditions underwent radical revision today as a result of yesterday's passing of the United States Steel common dividend. This was seen, not only in the weakness of the stock market, but in the general attitude of the speculative and investment public, to whom the action of the United States Steel directors seemed to carry unexpected implications.

Steel common opened at its minimum price of 48 and remained at that figure throughout the feverish and active session. Dealings in that issue were comparatively light, probably for the reason that it had little or no market at its arbitrary low level. In the so-called unofficial market, which came into vogue while the stock exchange was closed in the latter months of last year, the stock sold down to 435.

Steel preferred bore the brunt of the attack on that and allied issues, failing 52 points to within half a point of its minimum, and rallying fractionally. Even the sinking fund bonds, which normally show great steadiness, manifested a weakening tondency.

After the close of the market, official announcement was made that beginning with tomorrow's trading the minimum price of Steel common would be lowered to 43. Denial was given to reports that other active issues were to undergo immediate revision.
