Nebraska Scotts Bluff Wants Editors' Convention for the Year 1916

SCOTT'S BLUFF, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—When the Nebraska Press association meets in Omaha next April Scott's Bluff will be represented by a committee bearing a neatly embossed invitation, asking the association to hold its 1916 convention in this city. The objection that Scott's Bluff is too far away will be met by an offer that will startle the newspaper people. As roughly outlined now, the plan is to have the members of the association met at the most convenient point by a special train, and then make them the guests of Scott's Bluff from the time they board the special until they are returned to the initial point. This will overcome the objection of expense because of long distance passenger tariff. While in Scott's Bluff the newspaper people will be taken in automobiles all over the great irrigated sections and shown the projects completed and under way.

Over Three Hundred Auto Tags in Month

TO FILE FOR WATER POWER RIGHTS ON DISMAL RIVER

Wilson, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners for Blaine county, has written to State Engineer Price that he intends to file an application for water power rights on the Dismal river. The project is to divert water from the river to irrigate the land.

Two Feet of Snow at West Point.

WEST POINT, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—The weather, which on Sunday was rain snow and sleet, developed during Sunday night into an old-fashioned heavy snowstorm with a strong northwest wind. Over two feet of snow has fallen and is badly drifted. Railway travel is suspended and telephone and telegraph service is badly demoralized. The temperature is comparatively mild. The storm has been particularly severe on stock.

Would Compel Return of Part Of Right-of-Way

LINCOLN, Feb. 2.—(Special.)—A plan to make the Union Pacific railway turn back to the state a portion of its 600 feet of right-of-way has been embodied in a bill introduced by Representative T. M. Osterman of Central City, which he thinks will meet the test of the courts. Hereafter the courts have held that the railway company has a right to retain its right-of-way.
