The third annual convention of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States will open teday, with about 600 representative businessmen attending. The program includes addresses by President Wilson and Secretary Bryan.

President Wilson advised the senate that the secretary of state held that it would not be compatible with the public interest to make public correspondence between the United States and British governments regarding the latter's action in declaring turpentine and rosin contraband of war.

Representatives of farmers organizations met and organized the "Rural Credit League of America." A resolution was adopted requesting the appointment by congress of a joint subcommittee to hold hearings on such personal rural credit bills as may be presented by persons having sufficient authoritative backing.
