Few Alterations in New York Meeting.

NO RADICAL ACTION IS TAKEN

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.-The annual m ing of the Intercollegiate Foot Ball Rules committee, held for the purpose of considering changes in the rules for 1915, closed here late today without radical alteration in the playing core:

The principal changes include giving the ball to opponents on a forward pass out of bounds, made on the fourth down, at the point where the pass was made; the increasing of the game officials from three to four and the limiting of resubstitution of players to the beginning of a period. The committee also earnestly ecommended the numbering of players, but did not make it a mandatory rule. Forward Pass Buling.

Under the 1914 a forward pass out of bounds whether touched by a player or not, gave the opponents at the point where it crossed the line. Because of the greater accuracy of throw it was fre-quently resorted to on the fourth down in place of the pust in order to force the opposing team to open its attack close to the side line.
