# NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Demoralization on Foreign Exchange and Disquiet Regarding Diplomacy Overshadow All.

LONDON SIGHT DRAFTS FALL

NEW YORK, Peb. 15.—Demoralization in the foreign exchange markets, as indicated by a further decline in cables and other remittances on London to the lowest rates within the recollection of veteran bankers, and increased concern respecting the diplomatic situation, overshadowed all other considerations in fooday's stock market. Sight drafts on London fell to H.S., and continental exchange was affected to a like degree; even switzerland. Italy and other neutral nations reflected the abnormal situation now prevailing in all the financial markets of the old world.

The break in London exchange followed enormous offerings of commercial bills acquired by our bankers and merchants in connection with heavy sales of our commodities and merchandise abroad. In the opinion of experts, exchange between New York and most European centers will continue to decline, unless the Bank of England releases more of the gold now held to its credit at Ottaws.

Another interesting foreign development which bore more or less directly on the exchange situation was the announcement made by representatives of the British government that no joint war loan was contemplated by the allies, but that the smaller states which espouse the cause will be financed as conditions and requirements arise.
