Wheat Jumps Up from Three to Five Cents, While Corn Drops a Half Cent.

EXPORTERS BUYING FUTURES

OMAHA, Feb. 16, 1918. The export sales on Saturday, following the sharp declines, were reported at 1,000,000 bu., and many grain men at the seaboard said that this amount was quite conservative. Exporters were obliged to buy the futures in a liberal way in order to protect cash sales made abroad. In addition shorts took on considerable wheat.

Net gains for the day were \$4.95 in wheat and while there were declines of 4.95 from the best prices the feeling

Corn was 140% higher and hats 140% cup. Corn had the wheat market to help it somewhat, while outs continued to pursue an independent course, with strength unquestioned. Abot 700,000 bu. oats were reported as worked at the seaboard, as well as two cargoes late Saturday, later amounting to about 260,000 bu.

Cash sales of corn were 312,000 bu. here, with 250,000 bu, to exporters.

The larger packers were in the lead as sellers of May lard yesterday, and there was a fair commission house demand with May and July pork most in favor. Grain helped the market no little. The weakness and final decline in values were caused by the placing of a duty on hog products of 7%c going into Canada.
