NEW YORK STOCK MARKET
Exchange Dull and Heavy Owing to
Fear Caused by Interna-
tional Situation.
TRADING IS MAINLY SHORT
NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—The apprehension
and uncertainty attending indications
and conditions were once more potent factors
in today's dull and heavy stock market.
Trading was ultra-professional, and
mainly on the short side, in the early
session that faction renewed its attacks
on leading shares which fell a point or
more, corners showing greatest weakness.
Later prices made gradual recovery, but
in the final hour selling of American
Smelting in large volume brought re-
newed unsettlement, the closing being
up or near the lowest level of the day.
Baltimore & Ohio, New Haven & South-
ern railway preferred were among the
stocks that fell to new low, or near
former minimum quotations. Some of
the dormant specialties yielded 1 to 3
points, with a sharp decline in the
preferred shares.
Pressure was not affected by the com-
pany's annual report which showed an
extraordinary shrinkage in net earnings
an increase in surplus of \$700,000 after
payment of the preferred dividends.
Foreign exchange gave less reason for
unprecedented declines. France and
marks also showed more stability, but the
situation as a whole continued somewhat
peculiar.

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET
Wheat Again Goes Down in Price,
with Corn and Oats in Hot
Pursuit.
SCARCITY IN THE CASH WEAT
OMAHA, Feb. 17, 1915.
There were complaints of a general
scarcity of cash wheat in all positions
and in all markets. The total amount
of that grain aggregated sales were only
30,000 bushels in all positions and buying
orders held in the various markets were
said to have aggregated several million
bushels. There was an increase in pre-
ferred receipts yesterday, the total
amounting to 1,000,000 bushels. Clear-
ances from the seaboard were 1,175,000
bushels.
In addition to the war as a bull factor
in wheat we are coming to the time
of unfavorable crop reports will com-
mence to come in and whether there has
been any growing weather or not, the re-
ports will have more or less effect on
values.
