## GERMAN OFFENSIVE CHECKED

Paris Gives Out Review of Operations on the Eastern War

SUCCESS CROWNS RUSS MOVE

PARIS, March 2.-There was given ou n Paris this afternoon a review of recent military activities in the eastern arens of the war, which reads as follows: "The situation in Russin: The German

offensive movement in the direction of the Nieman river appears to have been definitely checked. On the left bank of this stream the German forces hold a line running approximately from Pilliwiszki to Mariampol to Simno, twenty-five kilo meters west of Olita; to Serejee, southeast of Simno, to the ben in the Niemen to the north of Rodno, to Chantabine in the upper valley of the Bobr. "In the vicinity of this last mentioned

place and on the southern boundary of the forest of Augustowo there have been during the last few days several violent engagements which have resulted to the advantage of the Russians. The attacks delivered by the Germans on Ossowetz and in the region of Jedwabno, to the northwest of Lomza have not resulted

"In the region of Przasynsz the Russians, after having driven back the attacks of the Germans, undertook a vigorous offensive along a front extending for about forty kilometers. This movement was crowned with success. Krasneselo and Przasynsz were recaptured and the

nange. All the recent atacks of the Austrian and German forces, which were particularly severe in the direction of Koziuwki and Rozniatow have been repulsed with heavy losses. Judging from other sources also it would seem that the progress of the enemy in this vicinity has been definitely checked.

To organize the forces with which Field Marshal Hindenburg undertook this offensive movement, which today stands checked, the Germans brought three army corps from the southern part of their eastern fronts; two others from stations in the interior of the country and one from the French front."
