Whether the annexation bill, if enacted into law with the emergency clause at once and becoming effective so far as the actual merger is concerned only after

a period of twenty days, would enable residents of suburbs to be candidates and vote at the coming city election, is a question which has been put to Election Commissioner Moorhead.

"The general opinion has been that residents of the suburbs would be eligible to participate in the election if annexation passes with the emergency clause," said the commissioner. "It is true, however, that a question as to this may arise. I decided not to cross this bridge until I came to it; have given absolutely no consideration to the point, and would not want to make any statement concerning it."
