McVann Has Many Cases to Be Heard at Chicago Soon

E. J. McVann, manager of the traffic bureau of the Commercial club, has just returned from Chicago, where he is handling a great many freight rate cases for Omaha shippers before a special examiner of the Interstate Commerce commission.
