

MANY CHANGES TO DRY COLUMN MADE

Returns from Municipal Elections Reveal Trend Toward Restriction of Liquor Traffic.

NINE CHANGE BACK TO WETS

very tame affair, there being no opposition because the democrats endorsed all the candidates nominated by the citizens' mass meeting. There was no issue on the saloon question and the city remains wet. The vote in the lightest vote ever cast in the city election, only 200 votes being cast out of 1,200.

WOLFE—For license, 84 against license, 77. The town has been dry the last year.

BATTLE CREEK—Only one ticket in the field. The citizens' mass meeting elected Urick, democrat. Forty-eight votes were polled. There were no issues, the question of license or no license having never been an issue here. The town wet.

WINTERS—Town goes dry by 10 votes, the first time in its history. The citizens' mass meeting elected Winters and P. Thompson were elected members of the board. There have been two saloons in the town. Pool halls were defeated by about 100. Local issues brought this about, in which the proposition of changing was uppermost.

DODGE—In village election F. C. Horack and H. R. Holsten were elected trustees, both new men. Only one ticket nominated, but some scratching, saloons not an issue. A. Schlosser and E. W. Montgomery retiring trustees.

Anna Changes.

ALMA—Alma dry. Was wet in 1914. J. C. Thompson elected mayor. The question for or against license was the main issue in the village election. The three candidates for village trustees on the law and order ticket which was virtually the license ticket were elected over the two candidates on the citizens' protective ticket by a large majority. In the specific voting on the license question the wet ticket polled a majority of 25 votes.

HARTINGTON—Mayor Anton Wald was re-elected for the first time today. There was one ticket in the field and no issue was voted on. Only a light vote was cast. The three candidates elected are: Clerk, W. H. Polke; treasurer, R. G. Mason; city engineer, J. D. C. Smith; councilmen, E. H. Morten and M. E. Eby. Town remains wet.

SARGENT—Guy Brown and D. M. Shaw were elected village trustees. Sunday base ball carried. No change.

LYONS—W. S. Newmeyer and G. W. Little were chosen as members of the village board at the town election today. The vote stood as follows: W. S. Newmeyer, 17; Little, 13; Robbins, 8; Prine, 11; Little and Prine ran independent. Newmeyer and Robbins were nominated by the citizens' ticket, which is supposed to be the temperance ticket. Town remains dry.

FAIRMOUNT—Hugh Ralston, W. G. Parker and W. T. Greenlee were elected to succeed themselves as village trustees. License was the main issue. The wet pool hall, bowling alley and Sunday base ball were defeated. It was also voted that the town board be instructed to install storage batteries for light plant.

WYMORE—Dry by sixty-four. Wet last year. Adam McMullen, mayor.

WYOMING—Dry. No change. S. A. Wassum, mayor. Pool halls defeated.

DECATUR—Dry. No change. A. H. Woodard, mayor. City hall bonds defeated.

RAMONA—Dry. No change. GILBERT—The vote on saloons. Dry last year.

HARRARD—Dry. Wet last year. Norris Thomas, mayor.

No change at Falls City. FALLS CITY—Dry by twenty-six. No change. R. A. Heacock, mayor.

YERDON—Wet. No change. DAVID CITY—At the city election held here today the saloon question was the main issue. Votes on this proposition was a majority of fifty against issuing license, against a majority of three for the dry on this question a year ago. H. Evans was re-elected mayor. H. H. Sellhorn, treasurer; S. Clingman, engineer; W. C. Pinkinger, H. W. Whitcomb, W. C. Cook, councilmen; R. B. Swennie, city clerk; H. O. Schaaf, G. A. Becker and J. D. Coe were re-elected members of the school board.

PLATTSMOUTH—Emmons J. Richey, republican, was elected mayor, defeating John P. Sattler, present incumbent. H. M. Sonnenblich was re-elected treasurer. The liquor question was not an issue, but Plattsmouth will have seven saloons for another year.

EMERSON—Emerson swung into the wet column again today, 123 to 71. A. Davis, Frank Hoeny and E. A. Bierdorf were elected to the council. Four saloons will open up in May.

WAYNE—D. H. Cunningham, republican, mayor. No vote on saloons; now dry.

CREIGHTON—H. J. Steinhause, mayor. No vote on saloons; now wet.

Dry at Friend. FRIEND—Friend went dry by a majority of 21. C. E. Bowley, who ran on the wet ticket, is elected mayor. John Scheidt, dry, carried the First ward for councilman and J. E. Whitcomb, wet, the second ward. H. E. Briley, wet, elected clerk.

BANCROFT—For license, 94; against license, 87; wet, 5 majority. No board elected mayor.

BENNINGTON—Charles Schlep and George Dierks, both republicans, were elected to the village board. Town remains wet. No issue.

HYANNIS—Dry by a majority of 27. Last year wets carried by a majority of 1, but no saloon here during the last year because a petition with 200 signatures, number of freeholders would not be secured. Trustees elected for two years are Dan Egan, W. M. Alden and A. E. Sheldon.

EUSTIS—The trustees elected are F. H. Schroeder, William Schlipf, and W. S. Jernett. The village remains in wet column.

ARAPAHOE—Arapahoe remains in dry column by a larger majority than last year. The vote was 66 for license and 114 against. Charles A. Patterson was elected mayor; E. C. Wagner, clerk, and R. F. Emmett, treasurer.

DEWEY—Town went dry by one vote, first time in six years. Vote on bonds for public park defeated.

displace democrats making the council five republicans and three democrats. Clerk Delamater, republican, and Treasurer, Plambeck, democrat, were re-elected. The only issue was more publicity of the affairs of public utilities. The election means a shakeup in the board of public works.

SCHUYLER—Otto Zuelow, republican, elected mayor, no opposition; John Gaeth, democrat, treasurer; Allen Cameron, republican, clerk. License was not an issue.

PRINSON—The town in its first city election in the majority contest cast a total of 215 votes. Nelson, democrat, received 142; Havens, republican, 74. No issue involved.

OVERTON—There was no issue here today. G. W. Sinclair, J. W. Holmes and Walter Trimble were elected councilmen.

SEWARD—The proposition to vote \$500 bonds for a new high school building was carried five to one. George Merritt was elected mayor and Mark Hulsizer, councilman in the East ward, John Mullinger in the West ward.

OAKLAND—A. Haimmerstrom was re-elected mayor by a large majority. License was defeated, two to one.

MINNESES—Minden went dry by majority. The citizens' mass meeting elected mayor over I. A. Hill by two votes.

NORTH BEND—The law and order ticket, which was elected over the republican city treasurer and W. D. Kelley, O. Anderson and W. Palmer members of the city school board.

LEKKEMAN—Benkeman stays dry. The citizens' mass meeting elected Mayor, H. S. Villars, treasurer; H. S. Villars, clerk; J. H. Kellough were re-elected to town board.

Pool Halls Defeated. LEXINGTON—Mayor Jim Byrns was elected on the business man's ticket by a majority of 68. The city went dry by a majority of 50. Pool halls were defeated by a majority of 14.

GRILEY—J. J. Collins and Henry Magin of the citizens' ticket, and C. A. Harris, people's ticket, elected to council. Harris being no other candidates. Pool hall license also won.

ST. EDWARD—Citizens' municipal party elected. No change on saloon question by 25.

ASHLAND—By a majority of 19 Ashland remained in the dry column today. A gain of ten over last year and the fifth consecutive dry victory. Mayor Thomas Daily was re-elected by a majority of 109 over E. J. Rose. Dr. J. M. Moss was elected councilman in the First ward by 70 over R. Dean. Sunday base ball carried by 2 majority.

RED CLIFF—Red Cliff remains dry by an increased majority. Mayor Thomas Damerel was re-elected mayor on the citizens' ticket. C. J. Pope and Dr. C. E. Cross were elected members of the Board of Education.

MCCOOK—McCook went wet today by a majority of forty votes. On the republican ticket Mayor Lawrence, was elected, together with practically all of the present city officials. McCook now has six saloons.

Wahoo Becomes Wet. WAHOO—The citizens' candidate for mayor, William J. Lehr, was elected over the municipal party ticket, J. H. Brown, by a majority of eighty-nine votes. Both candidates were republicans but running as candidates on local organizations. The town, which has been dry the last year, went wet by a majority of twenty-one votes.

KEARNEY—Kearney went dry in the election today. License being defeated by a majority of 109. The saloon out of business in this city. C. W. Kiebler was elected mayor of the city by a small majority, approximately seventeen votes. The four former councilmen, who were running for re-election, were all defeated.

KOLBIDGE—John Bragg, treasurer, candidate for the office of mayor, was elected today by a majority of 121 votes over his opponent, Peter Miller of the republican-democratic party. Holdrege still remains dry, the issue not being voted on.

MILFORD—Milford returns W. G. Harold, mayor, citizens caucus, dry, no change.

WEEPING WATER—F. H. Gorder was elected mayor on the business temperance ticket to serve his ninth term. The Carnegie library question was defeated by a vote of 16 to 18. Mrs. F. H. Gorder and J. J. Davis were elected members of the school board. About thirty women of the town voted on this ticket.

SIDNEY—Three hundred and fifty-three votes were cast at the city election today. The wets won by a majority of thirty-one. This is the first time the issue has been raised here.

Ablion is Dry. ABLION—This city today changed from wet to dry by twenty-seven majority. The following officers were elected: S. J. Payne, mayor; Robert Larson, clerk; W. C. Day, treasurer; F. M. Sillock, engineer; T. J. Matthews, A. W. Ladd, councilmen; Frank Day and J. M. Mey-

Bulgars Claim Not To Blame for Raids

LONDON, April 6.—The Bulgarian minister in London gave out the text today of a note from his government disclaiming responsibility for the recent invasion of Serbia by a force described as Bulgarian irregulars. The note repeats in the main what has already been set forth in dispatches from Sofia. It is explained that the uprising was instigated by Turks among the inhabitants of that part of Macedonia included in Serbia. These "Turks rose in revolt, the note says, and fled to Bulgarian territory, pursued by Serbian troops.

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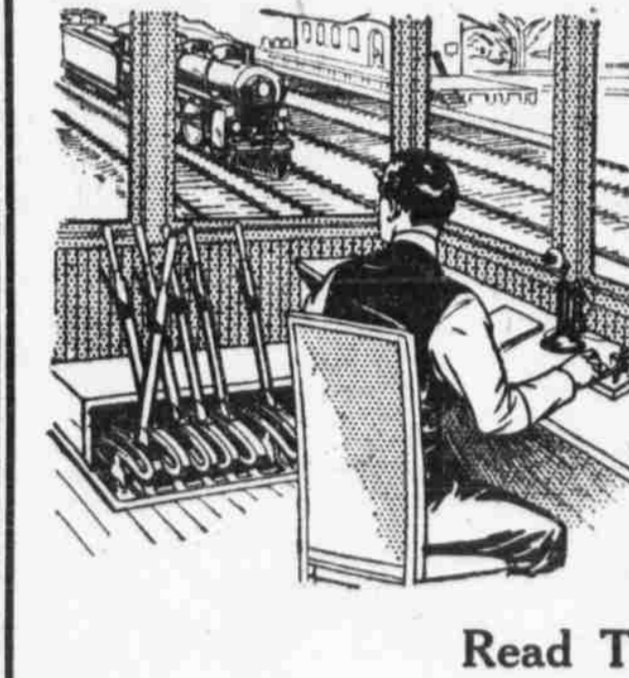
