Executive of South Australia Criticized for Suggesting Country Should Be Kept White.

PRIME MINISTER TAKES A HAND

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) MELBOURNE, Australia, April 2.—The subject of "White Australia" and the question of admitting Asiatic immigrants recently was discussed publicly by one of the state governors in the commonwealth, with the immediate result that he was officially asked for an explanation, and he expressed his regret that he had said anything at all on that head.

The executive who spoke his mind was Sir Henry Galway of South Australia, and it was the prime minister of the commonwealth, Andrew Fisher, who called him to account.

Mr. Fisher was speaking at a luncheon at an agricultural fair in South Australia and he devoted part of his speech to the northern territory, the huge area in the upper part of Australia which is under federal control through the medium of an administrator. It is a much debated question how the territory is to be settled for the development it needs.
