

WANTS \$50,000 FOR A FORCIBLE KISS

Mrs. Edith Hicks is suing A. A. Clark of Council Bluffs before Judge Leslie.

GRAND JURY TAKES A HAND

Mrs. Edith Hicks, 21 years of age, is suing Albert A. Clark, 60, wealthy resident of Council Bluffs, for \$50,000 damages in District Judge Leslie's court.

The kiss, an alleged attempt to embrace Mrs. Hicks and alleged mental suffering caused to her by his conduct, are elements in her claim for damages.

Mr. Clark's defense is a denial of all Mrs. Hicks' charges and a counter charge of conspiracy to compel him to pay a large sum of money.

Mrs. Hicks is now living at the Harney hotel with her husband, Lyzio Hicks. In April, 1913, she was employed at Mr. Clark's home as an over-seer of servants during the illness of Mrs. Clark. Hicks was employed by Mr. Clark as a chauffeur.

Jury Selected.

A jury was selected at the morning session of court. John O. Yelzer and Matt Gering, representing Mrs. Hicks, questioned jurors regarding their opinions of damage suits brought by women against men.

Preparations for trial and the securing of evidence for the case now on trial during 1914 were conducted so vigorously by opposing attorneys that a second suit for \$100,000 damages brought by Mrs. Hicks for alleged slander was the result.

A contest was also waged by opposing attorneys as the result of an attachment by the plaintiff of an extensive new automobile secured while Mr. Clark was making a visit to Omaha.

The suit now on trial was originally brought in Council Bluffs, but was transferred to Omaha on account of failure to secure service on the defendant on the Iowa side of the river.

Difficulties Which Confront the Papers Published in Omaha Are Shown.

TO ELECT OFFICERS TONIGHT

That the college papers published in Omaha today under an unusual handicap in getting advertising was brought out at the opening of the second annual convention of the Nebraska College Press association in the Loyal hotel.

The young people met in Berlin, where Miss Meyer spent several years studying music. The engagement was announced a year ago in February, and Miss Meyer returned to this country several months later.
