

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., April 30.-Missourt's champion western one-mile relay team today was entered for the onemile relay championship at the relay car-nival to be held on Friday and Saturday of this week. Missouri's team was the big surprise at the relay games held at Des Moines last Saturday. They de-

feated the other western colleges in the mile and turned the distance in 3 minutes 22 1-5 seconds, which is one second under the present college record time. Murphy. Easton, Wyatt and Niedorp, men who showed such good the same form last Saturday, will represent Missouri here. The addition of the western champions lends additional interest to a race that already promises to be one of the most sensational of the year. Missouri will not only have to heat Chicago and Northwestern again, but they will find in Pennsylvania and Harvard even faster quartets.
