DENIAL BY BAN JOHNSON CHICAGO, April 23.-Negitiations ex

In the face of a positive denial made this afternoon by President Johnson that any negotiations for peace were being carried on, representatives of the independent league admitted that plans for peace had been discussed and that at a conference today held by President Gilmore, Robert B. Ward of the Brooklyn club and William Robertson of the Butfalo club a draft of peace terms, which would involve the virtual elimination of the Federals as a third league, was made. This draft will be submitted to President Tener, it was said, when he arrives to
