ROURKES ARE NOW LEADING THE LOOP

ERROR GIVES HOSTILE RUNS

If you will carefully lamp the well known standing of this Western loop you will perceive that perched at the top of the column are our own little Rourkelets. For yesterday while the obliging Grizzlies were harpooning the lowly Kaws, Mr. Franklin Johnson licked the spots off the Sioux, 3 to 2, and thus Omaha occupy the chosen position at the top of the ladder.

Thirsting for revenge over the trimming administered by Thomas Blodgett opening day, Josh Clarke and his tribe of Indians essayed to scalp the Rourkees yesterday by introducing Kirby White. But Marly Krug's athletes were not to be scalped and ere the sun set in the west another glorious victory had been annexed.

Mr. Johnson certainly held the Sioux City chaps in the hollow of his hand. One measly bingle, a scratch infield hit by Phelps, was the only mark in the hit column. It is true Franklin encountered occasional difficulties by persistent passing of Sioux sluggers, but he managed to deliver the goods in the pinches.

Error Contributes Only Scores. The two runs copped by the invading warriors was due to an error by Clarence Smith. The wind blew the ball around and Smithy muffed it, while two runners on base by virtue of gifts from Franklin, galloped home.

This disaster occurred in the opening frame, Cooney was pickings for Whalen, but Sheehan and Clarke were given walk. James Kane was put out and a third walk dished up to Henning. At this point, with the bases choked, Callahan lifted the fly which Smith dropped and Sheehan and Clarke counted.

Kane Is Fined Five. Also in the first inning James Kane was given a little five rock fine by Umpire Van Sickle as evidence of his esteem for the great Sioux City first sacker. James spoke a few harsh words to the ump, who objects to such treatment.

After the opener the Sioux made first base but once during the remainder of the contest. In the eighth Johnson walked Sheehan and Clarke, but a double play engineered by Whalen prevented any further parading on the runway.

The lone hit scored by Sioux City came in the fourth. Phelps hit a roller to second and he beat the throw to first. He died there, as White was a ceph, via the whitest route.

Thomason Puts a Double. Peevish at the two-run lead accumulated by the victors, Thomason opened the second with a double to center. Huslieman pasted a blow to left and Tommy hustled gally home.

The count was tied up in the fourth when Huslieman walked and raced to third on Krueger's hit through short. It was a pretty keen piece of base running, especially for a big fellow like Huslieman. To further prove to the Sioux that Huslieman was a speed merchant, Manager Krug called for a squeeze play. Schliesner laid down a bunt to Kane and Jimmy was so surprised to see Huslieman score on it he almost missed catching Fritz at first.

Breen Makes Spectacular Hit. The winning count came in the seventh. With two down Smith busted a knock to right and McCannick led the pill trickles through him. The tempo, while Smith went to third, Dickie Breen was the lad on the job with the psychological hit and Smith counted the winning tally.
