MUST GIVE NOTICE **OFINCREASED VALUE**

Supreme Court Holds County Board Must Make Complaint Before Boosting Assessment.

RULE LAJD IN DAMAGE CASE

(From h Staff Correspondent LINCOLN, Neb., May 1 .-- (Special Telegram. -According to the supreme court a county beard of equalization cannot raise the assessed valuation of the real estate of an individual taxpayer without a complaint and without notice to the rerson affected thereby. The amount of the taxes as levied upon the valuation above that fixed by the county assessor is void, and its collection may be eninined.

The case comes from Douglas county, and was brought by Charles H. Brown. who lost out in the Dougins county district court, that court holding that the notion of the board was legal in raleing the valuation of the west half of lot 4, block 118, in Omaha, from \$170,000 to \$186,0000 without complaint or notice Mr. Brown.

Another case of a like nature, Annie Kuykendall against Douglas county, was decided likewise.

Court Could Order Examination. The supreme court holds that in dismissing the case brought by Mildred Parmenter against the Omaha Gas company for infuries, Judge A. C. Troup was within his rights as a district judge.

The plaintiff claimed personal injuries sustained, and Judge Troup ordered examination by physicians to discover the extent of her injuries. The plaintiff rofuned to submit to the coart's order and Judge Troup dismised the case.

The plaintiff then applied to the su-preme court for a writ of mandamus to compel the reinstatement of her case, and the high court denies the writ.






