Bee Want Ads Produce Results. Roosevelt's Lawyer Opens Argument in Barnes' Libel Suit

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 19 .- John M. Bowers, chief counsel for Theodore Roosevelt, today summed up in the su-preme court here the case of the defense William Barnes' suit for libel. He assalled the truth of many of the statethe plaintiff and presented arguments to the jury designed to show that his client was justified in saying the things he did about the former chairman of the republican state committee.

The lawyer contended that the suit was not brought with the purpose to secure pecuniary damages, but in reality was a "game to lower the defendant before the peopel of the United States." Counsel for Mr. Barnes were to sum

up the case of the plaintiff this after-Justice Andrews, presiding, ruled that the jury would not be allowed to consider

the allegations that the article upon which the suit is based was privileged because the plaintiff was in public life and a political campaign was in progress at the time of its publication.



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
