OLD SHOE TIED TO BILL OF EXCEPTIONS IN DAMAGE SUIT. An old shoe, worn by Homer G. Stapleton, plaintiff in a damage suit for personal injuries against the Burlington railroad, at the time he was hurt, has been made a part of the bill of exceptions sent to the supreme court in the appeal taken by the railroad. Stapleton secured a verdict for \$1,500 in Judge Troup's district court.
