Crops Under Water.

Advices to the Rook Island local ofrices indicate that west of Fairbury and into Kanana for 100 miles or more the whole country in under water from the rains of last week and that about all of the section of country from five to ten ten miles wide, crops and practically all destroyed. Over this stretch there are miles of country submerged to a depth of one to ten feet and in the low lands there are numerous places where the water is fifteen feet deep.


