

All records of the local internal revenue office for a day's collections, in the first year of the income tax's with one exception, were broken operation, dividends were not required Wednesday when the receipts of the to be figured in estimating a person's inoffice were \$67,565.01.

Total collections of this office for the fiscal year, which ended Wednesday, amounted to \$2,\$78,355.06. This was an increase of \$17,187,91 over the total collections during the preceding year.

Collections during the month of June were \$491,670.22. Although the number of persons pay-


