CORN PRICES HOLD THEIR OWN

The market for wheat was very slow today and there was only one carload re-ported sold. the demand and the market soid and lower.

Oats continued firm today and sold unchanged to he higher. Sales of oats for export were 180,000 bu.

A great many of the wheat speculators are bearish and it is generally thought that they are correct in their idea. New wheat is coming into most of the markets of the southwest and southeast, but in the more northern sections harvesting has been delayed considerably by the long drawn out wet weather.

Clearances were: Wheat and flour squal to 42,000 bushels; corn, 47,000 bushels; oats, 53,000 bushels.

Liverpool close: Wheat and corn, not quoted.

prices continued on the upgrade with an urgent general demand headed by a big rush of shorts, knowing the crop infection appeared as yet to be restricted to just a few points.

Pressure from receiving houses indicating hedging sales from the harvest districts of Illinois and other regions nearby was chiefly responsible for the heaviness of the wheat market before the black rust scare began. Even after the market as a whole was scoring an advance, the July option showed less vigor than the later deliveries. When trading was at a stand the greater part of premiums for cash wheat here, as compared with July, had disappeared.

Good weather tended to make corn relatively easy. The strength of wheat, however, finally had a bullish effect. Outs moved up more readily than corn. Decreasing stocks acted as more than an offset for favorable advices regarding the crop.


