Rainfall Covers Practically All of Nebraska and Western Iowa— Washout at Herman.

WIRES BLOWN DOWN AT ONAWA

The railroads of Nebraska came out from under the effects of Thursday night's storm much better than officials expected as they watched the threatening clouds.

During the evening and night heavy rains fell in practically all portions of the state, down in Kansas, over in Missouri, Iowa and up in South Dakota.

Through the South Platte country and pretty well out toward Colorado nearly every station reported an inch or more of rain.

At Clay Center the precipitation was three and one-half inches.
