## ROURKES TRIM UP THE TIGERS TWICE

### Ingersoll Wears Out the Lincoln Batters in First Game, Lasting Until Eighth.

### SECOND ENDS FIVE TO THREE

LINCOLN, July 24.—(Special Telegram.)—Lincoln dropped both ends of a double-header here today to Omaha on lumpy fielding.

Omaha won the first game, 3 to 2, and the second, 5 to 2.

Ingersoll pitched a nice game for the Rourkes in the first, but was taken out in the eighth to allow Kruger to bat for him. Thompson finished the game and succeeded in suppressing the Tigers.

Omaha jumped into the lead at the start when Smith walked, went to second on Bren's sacrifice and scored on Cy Forsythe's double. It was one, two, three until the fifth, when Lincoln hopped onto Ingersoll for two runs.

Wolfe singled and moved up to third on McCallister's double. McIntyre's double brought both runners home.

Narveson lost his own game in the seventh. Blank reached first safely on Daley's error and took second on Daley's fly throw to first. Narveson fell down trying to field Ingersoll's hit and then threw the ball into the dog house, while Blank trotted home.

Omaha won in the ninth, when Schlieber doubled to left and went to third when Blank beat out an infield hit. Smith got a Texas leaguer over second and Schlieber came home with the winning run.

The Rourkes opened up strong on Emman in the second game. With two out, Forsythe doubled, scored on Krug's double, and then Kruger drove one over the fence for a home run.

The Tigers got two in the second. Lloyd singled, Williams, Elman and McCallister following suit.

Krug singled in the sixth, went to second on Krueger's sacrifice and scored when the Tigers fell down on an attempted double play. McIntyre walked, Daley beat out an infield hit and McIntyre scored on Williams' single. Krueger doubled in the eighth and scored on Varney's single. ## HIGH SCHOOL LAD WHO WINS CITY TENNIS TITLE.

### RUSSELL LARMON IS TENNIS CHAMP

### Defeats Harry Koch, Title Holder for Last Four Years, Three Sets Out of Four.

### KOCH AND SCRIB WINS DOUBLES



Before a gallery that applauded every play, good, bad and indifferent, the climax in the city tennis tournament was reached and the singles championship changed hands for the first time in five years. Russell Larmon now holds the title, which he took from the veteran, Harry Koch, today in the fastest tennis the city club courts has seen since many a day. The score was 6-2, 3-1, 4-4, 10-6.



Koch and Art Scriber won the doubles championship by defeating Cub Potter and Guy Beckett two straight matches, 6-2, 6-3. Koch and Scriber outlasted Potter and Beckett, although many of the games were played to a draw.

The Koch-Larmon match was for the best three out of five, and Larmon annexed the first one without any great display of tennis. After that, however, every point was hotly contested and the second set was won by Larmon only after many deuce games, and many well played points. For a time it seemed that each player could not win the serve of the other, and the games annexed by each player were offset by those taken by the other until each had seven to his credit. The Larmon got the hang of Koch's serve and took to game. He followed it up by winning his own service and the second set was his.

In the third set Koch drew on his reserve, and let himself out another notch. The play went faster, and the set ended with but four games to Larmon's credit. The gallery was enthusiastic, but was largely for Larmon. Every shot he made received applause out of proportion, quite often, to its importance, and every game he won called for prolonged blasts from the klaxons on the autos parked outside the enclosure.

The last set was the fastest one of the match, and the games won by both contenders mounted higher and higher until the gallery stood up and shouted at every play. Deuce games were common, and every point was fought for.

Larmon played safe on all of Koch's lobs, and only smashed into them when there was no chance to lose. Koch did the same, after losing a number of points by smashing into the net and out of the court. Both players used their heads and every ball was deliberately placed. Larmon played brilliantly, placing the balls in the most unexpected places, and both players had their serve down to a fine point.
