

SIX HOME RUNS ARE MADE IN SWIFTEST

Krueger, Blank, Shields and Spahr Each Hit Circuit Clouts and McCormick Makes Two.

OMAHA LOSES BY WIDE MARGIN

DENVER, Colo., July 25.—(Special Telegram)—As a result of the double victory on Saturday and the long ride from Lincoln, the Rockies drifted into Denver a little weary, but had plenty of pep at Broadway park when the "Round Trip Day." A pair of the hostiles, Blank and Krueger, crossed the pan for the visitors after circuit clouts, while for the Bears, McCormick hit the pill for two four-base drives, Shields whanged one over the fence on the first bounce, a feat that is seldom accomplished, and Spahr sent one to deep center for the sixth long distance run of the afternoon. The score was 15 to 7, Denver.

The Rockies hit Storer hard, but many hits were out by fast fielding. The Bears' outfield caught half a dozen fly balls, many of them scorching drives that looked like safeties. Faults on the part of the Rockies were costly, together with the heavy artillery of the locals. Storer acquired a base when Blank's attempt to flight the Sabbath program out, but Blodgett couldn't stand the pace and gave way to Everden in the third.

Rourke's Count First. Neither side scored in the first frame, but in the second the visitors crossed the plate with three tallies, thanks to the home run of Krueger. After this frame it was nothing to it for the home bunch. In the fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth rounds the Bears piled up nine more counts on heavy swats and on the mishaps of Omaha.
