Miss Bessie Waterman went to Newark, Wednesday to spend two weeks with her sister, Mrs. Ernest Pollard, and Mr. Pollard.

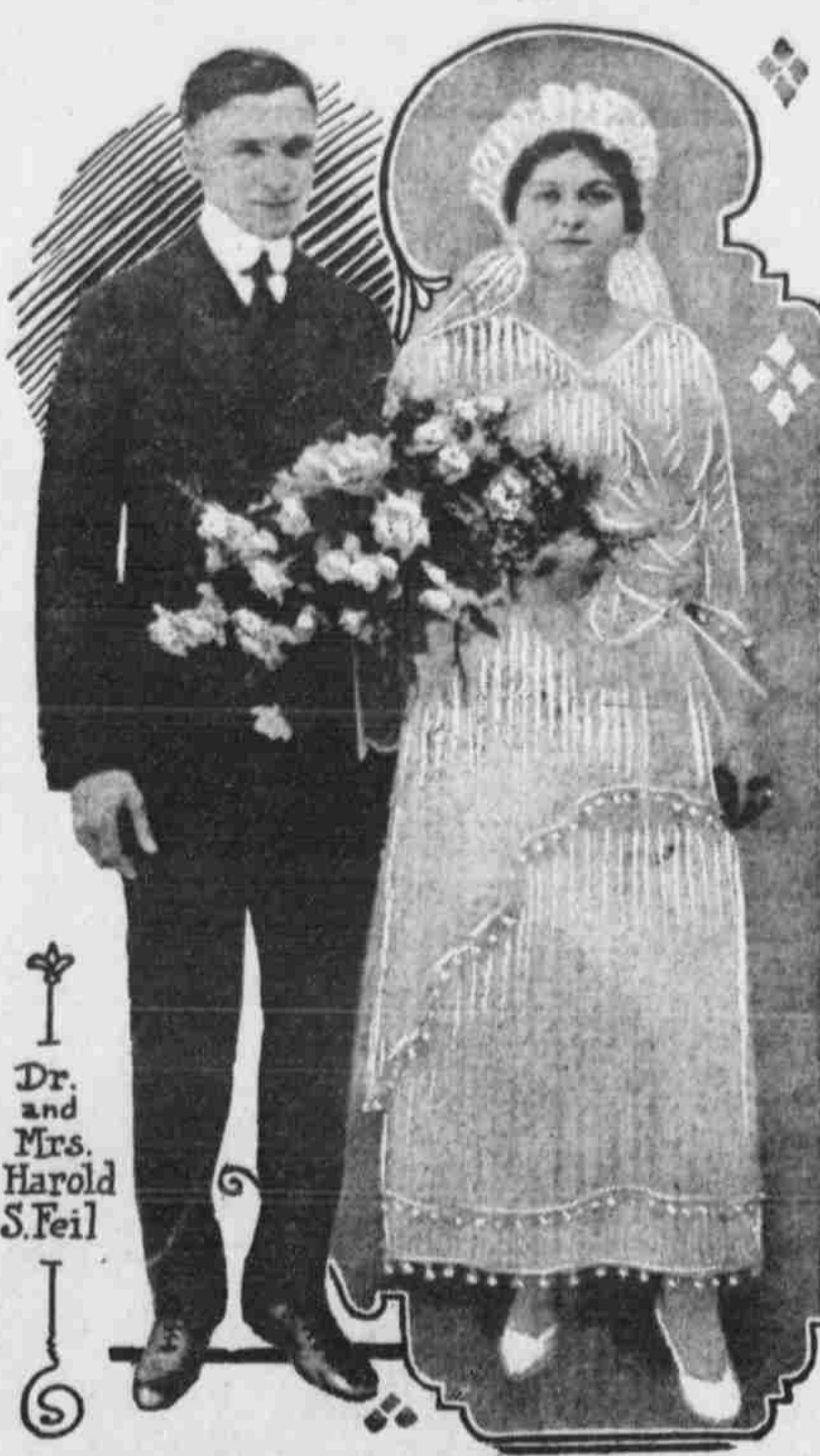
