Clarke Powell Is Made President of Tennis Association

Clarke G. Powell of Omaha was elected president of the Nebraska State Tennis association for 1915-16 at the annual meeting held in Lincoln, where the state tourney is now in progress. Charles Patterson of Arapahoe was made vice president, Frank Morgan of Wayne, secretary, and Harry Koch of Omaha, treasurer. Wayne will be the scene of the 1916 tournament.

Powell returned from Lincoln Saturday and declared that Koch would probably win the state title again and that Koch and Powell looked good for the doubles championship. Powell declared that despite the fact that rain had seriously hampered the playing of the event this year, the tennis enthusiasm out in the state had not been dampened any and that he expected an entry list of 150 at the 1916 tourney.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Most of Chicago's better known tennis players came through successfully in the opening rounds of the Western tournament on the Owenstonia club's courts at Lake Forest today.

Absence of out of town entrants, who are playing at Longwood or Lake Minnetonka, delayed the completion of the first round and the hardest early matches were expected Monday, when a contest between Heath Byford, Illinois state champion, and W. M. Johnsons of San Francisco, is expected to be a feature. Among early winners today was Nat Thornton of Atlanta, who showed excellent form in his defeat of Chester Williams of Chicago, 6-3, 6-3. The Weber brothers, well known intercollegiate tennis players, both won their first round match. Jerry beating Jay Chapolette, Chicago, without extending himself, 6-1, 6-2, and James disposing of D. F. Wiley, a local player, 6-3, 6-3.

The red-hot tip for the "transmulean" is that Everett Buckingham leads the other drivers in getting speed out of his mule. 
