Treasurer Hall Refuses to Pay Out Money on Vouchers, Though Attorney General Orders It.

FIRE COMMISSIONER IN FIX

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Aug. 3.—(Special.)—With the State Normal board members declaring themselves to be bigger than the governor who appointed them and the state treasurer reluctant to obey the opinions of the attorney general, the question of "Who is Who?" in the state house is becoming a very serious one. The trouble between the state treasurer and the attorney general is liable to cause inconvenience. The attorney general does not believe a fellow democrat should go around with his tongue hanging out because there is no money to buy refreshments. Several departments face the proposition of getting hold of their fees. The law kindly provides a way for them to turn them over to the state treasurer, but in the opinion of Treasurer Hall provides no way of getting them out again. Fire Commissioner Kilduff is in trouble because of this law and the refusal of Treasurer Hall to let him get out by vouchers the fees which he has turned in. Kilduff appealed to Attorney General Reed and the attorney simply said "that's easy, we'll fix it," and calling in his stenographer, he prompted dictated an opinion which authorized Kilduff to make out his vouchers. Auditor Smith to write the warrants and Treasurer Hall to cash the same. Everything went lovely until the warrants reached the treasurer's office and they stopped and no money was forthcoming. Mr. Hall can see no authority anywhere authorizing him to pay over the money and balks.

Notes from Osceola.

OSCEOLA, Neb., Aug. 3.—The Polk County Teachers' institute convenes in Osceola on next Monday of next week. State Superintendent Thomas will be in attendance on one day to give two lectures. The institute coming at the same time as does the chautauque, it will be easier to plan for the entertainment of all than at any other time.

The sale of a farm today, four miles south of Osceola, marks the transfer of the E. L. Marquis quarter section to O. M. Nelson. This land is considered good Polk county farm land and is down on the Blue river. The consideration was \$25,000, and, considering that it was not quite a quarter section, will bring \$12.50 per acre.

While the rains have interfered somewhat in this county with the threshing of the wheat, yet generally the farmers have not been complaining and not much has been injured by the rain. The corn is growing very rapidly and is commencing to ear out. From present indications Polk county will offer a better corn crop than for several years. Seven auto loads of tourists who tried to get west from Columbus on the Lincoln Highway found the roads so very bad that they were compelled to drive around over the Meridian road, passing through Osceola on their way to the south Monday afternoon.

HARTINGTON, Neb., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—The annual picnic of the Cedar County Old Settlers and Pioneers' association will be held in Wynot on August 15. Harvest is on in this county, but is being greatly delayed by the wet weather. Ten inches of rain fell in Cedar county in July.

Nebraska HALL CALLS STATE BOARD

State Treasurer Says Assessment Board is Merely Laying Up Trouble and Interest to Be Paid Later.

LAW IS NOT COMPLIED WITH

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Aug. 3.—(Special.)—State Treasurer Hall is not in sympathy with the action of State Board of Assessment in cutting down the levy from that of last year. He believes it will deplete the treasury and give the following as his reasons, together with an explanation regarding the state bridge levy. He says: Referring to the rates of taxation as fixed by the State Board of Assessment yesterday, in which they fixed the rate of one-tenth of a mill for the state aid bridge fund want to call your attention to House Bill No. 105, passed by the last legislature, which specifically states: "There is hereby appropriated \$150,000 for the state aid bridge fund from the proceeds of the one-fifth of 1 mill per annum tax levy, on the grand and assessed roll of the state for said bridge fund, for the biennium ending March 31, 1917, to be expended according to law." By this law the levy is fixed at two-tenths of a mill, instead of one-tenth, as the board endeavored to do. It is my opinion that the two-tenth-mill as fixed by the legislature must prevail instead of the one-tenth, as fixed by the board. In the fixing of the four and one-tenth mill levy by the board for general fund levy, which they reduced from the 5-mill levy, as provided a year ago, they have out the income of the general fund for the next year over \$400,000. I don't need to take my pencil and figure for several weeks to prove to myself that this will deplete and bankrupt the general fund of the state one year from today. There is now on hand in our general fund \$400,000. Practically all of the state taxes have been collected and sent in by the county treasurers for the year 1915, and there will be very little yet coming until January 1, 1916. What will happen during the next year to over \$400,000, which will make the fund that much short, one year from today there will be no income to take care of the state's expenses from the general fund for the latter part of the year 1916. In my opinion, the levy should have been the same as it was a year ago. We do not spend money for a levy. We do spend it by appropriation. It makes no difference whether the levy is lowered or raised, as the expenses of the state are just the same, but if the levy is made too low the people of our state are made to suffer because of the payment of interest, and because of the bad credit of the state, and the state officers, employees and creditors will again have to suffer a loss of having to sell their warrants at a discount.

TREASURER HALL REPORTS CONDITION OF TREASURY

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Aug. 3.—(Special.)—According to the monthly report of State Treasurer Hall, there was a balance in the state treasury July 31 of \$1,664,891.63, as against \$1,225,363.11 a month ago. Receipts for the month were \$1,174,491.98 and expenditures \$738,392.46. Cash on hand is given at \$1.35, with \$1,612,612.51 on deposit. University fund warrants held as cash, \$36,009.14, and normal school, \$17,618.42. The funds of the state are invested as follows: Permanent school fund, \$4,700,123.63; Permanent fund, \$24,284,224.00; Agricultural college endowment, \$58,900.00; Normal endowment, \$1,250.00. Total, \$35,674,230.63.

CUTTING UP WET ALFALFA TO MAKE CATTLE FEED

WHEEPING WATER, Neb., Aug. 3.—(Special.)—A new use for the silo has been developed in this part of the state by the excessive rains. This is the saving of alfalfa crops which would be ruined for making hay. When a big cutting is once made and rains turn in and continue for several nights it is impossible to get the alfalfa dry enough for hay. Even the real wet alfalfa plants can be run through the ensilage cutter, though, and this has been done in a number of localities, and it is thought it will make first-class cattle feed.

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REQUISITION FOR WAGNER. ARRESTED HERE, HONORED

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Aug. 3.—(Special.)—Two requisitions covering the return of fugitives from justice passed through the governor's office today. The first comes from Colorado and asks that Anthony C. Wagner, now under arrest in Omaha be returned to that state. Wagner is accused of obtaining land under false pretenses in that he represented that he owned a tract of land in Cheyenne county, Nebraska, and a trade for land in Colorado gave a mortgage on the Nebraska real estate, the amount involved being \$2,000. The other requisition is issued on request of H. M. Nicholson, county attorney of Cuming county, who represents that S. W. Wahansky bought a bunch of horses of Schenck Bros., of that county

and gave a check, representing himself to be a representative of the firm called the East New York Horse company, buying the animals for the allies in Europe. The check drawn was for \$2,775, and was discovered to be worthless. He is under arrest in Sioux City. Centennial Hunt by Fall.
