Merchants Whose Stocks Confiscated Arrive at El Paso

EL PASO, Tex., Aug. 3.—A number of foreign shopkeepers of Chihuahua, Mexico, arrived here today. Their departure was occasioned by the confiscation by General Villa of their wares. The majority of the shopkeepers remained in Chihuahua, it was said, pending the outcome of the parleys between various foreign consuls and Villa looking to a modification of the confiscation order. Villa is understood to have offered payment for the goods taken, but on that basis it is not known here. The high prices complained of by Villa are justified, according to the arrivals today, because of the unstable currency and difficulties of exchange on the border. "General Villa did not say if the United States does not like my actions, it can go to hell. What he did say was: 'My telegraph lines are open to you. You may protest to your government. If they do not like it, they can come; I am ready for them.'"

Latest advice from Guzman indicate that the mutiny in the Villa garrison there has been suppressed. George Carothers, United States State department representative, arrived here today and went into consultation with Zach Cobb, collector of the port.

Hundreds Caught By Flood in Mine

INDIANA, Pa., Aug. 3.—Wading in water, at times up to their necks, 49 miners escaped early today from the Sample Run mine, near here, after being imprisoned for several hours. It is believed that no lives were lost, although the census of those employed in the shaft has not yet been completed. During the night heavy rains over the watershed an swollen a little stream near the opening that a great volume of water poured into the mine. Exit by the usual way was cut off and the men made their way to an air shaft and climbed to safety. Some of the men waded in water for almost a mile.

Window Trimmers Become Display Men

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Use of the name "window trimmer," as applied to the men who decorate store windows, was objected to in a resolution adopted by the International Association of Display Men, holding its annual convention here. About 3,000 members were present today. Manufacturers, trade journals and periodicals were requested to describe the men who ornaments the store windows as "display men." The executive committee approved a resolution opposing the display of show cards and price tickets containing misstatements of fictitious values.

Hundred Disputed Points in Western Rail Wage Award

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—The board of arbitration which last spring decided the wage demands of the firemen and engineers of the western railroads has been asked to reconvene to decide disputed points in its award. It was learned today. Some time ago the heads of the Brotherhood of Engineers issued a pamphlet giving their interpretation of the application of the award to the wage schedule of individual railroads. One hundred and forty-six points were interpreted from the viewpoint of the brotherhood.
