Richards is Allowed to Compete in High Jump Under Protest

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—Alva W. Richards of the Illinois Athletic club team, whose entry in the high jump at the Amateur Athletic Union championship, to be held here tomorrow, was protested by Martin Delaney, coach of the Chicago Athletic club team, will be allowed to compete under protest, according to a decision reached by the National Amateur body made public today. Richards' entry was protested on the ground that he is not a bona fide resident of the district for which he is competing. Richards won the high jump at the Olympic games at Stockholm, Sweden, in 1912, at a height of 1.50 meters. The committee that decided the Richards' case also ruled that all jumping competitions shall be held with the wind. It was the opinion of the committee that the next American Amateur Union championships be held in Newark, N. J.

MILLENER SAYS HE HAS HEATING DOWN TO SYSTEM

Dr. F. W. They take care of the furnace, the boilers, do the plumbing and the painting. By systemizing the work, his four men not only do the regular duties assigned, but they have their engine and boiler rooms as clean as a well kept kitchen.

McLoughlin Winner Over Norris Williams

BOSTON, Aug. 6.—Maurice F. McLoughlin of San Francisco today defeated R. Norris Williams, 23, of this city, the national lawn tennis champion in the challenge match of the Longwood singles, the oldest tennis tournament under club auspices in the United States. The score was 6-3, 6-3, 2-4, 6-2. Except in one set McLoughlin was master of nearly every situation. Williams' method of procedure at the outset was to rush his opponent to such an extent that the Californian would be unable to get openings, but the latter's defense was so tight that Williams soon had to fall back on his own defense. No important tennis match probably was ever played under worse conditions of weather and turf. A light rain fell during the afternoon and the players literally floundered about, often sprawling on the grass so insecure was the footing. McLoughlin's terrific forehand drives from back court were largely responsible for his victory. The game developed little or no lobbing and McLoughlin did not go to the net more than a half dozen times. It was the first time that the players had met since the national championship tournament at Newport a year ago, when Williams won the title from the Californian. By today's victory McLoughlin secures permanent possession of the Longwood bowl, having previously won two legs of it.
