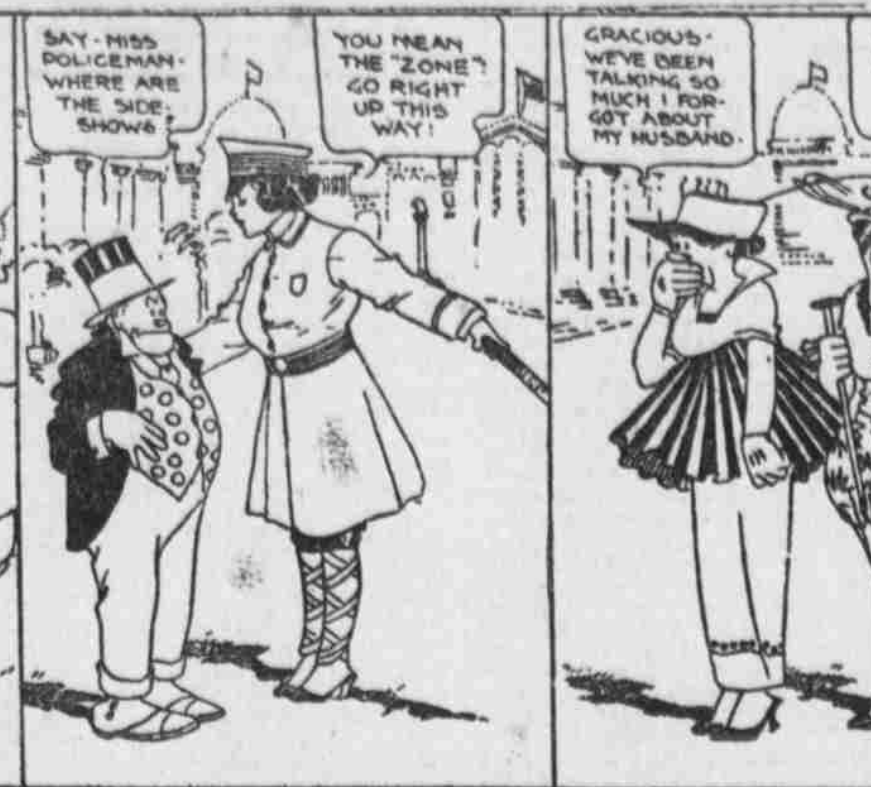

BOOSTER DAY GAME IS WON BY DENVER

Before Two Thousand and Forty-Five Persons Grizzlies Beat Rockies, Two to One.

When the well-known turnstile on the pay gate at Rourke park clicked its last click, yesterday the register read 2,045. That was the official number of paid admissions at the booster-day game, rather a disappointment to Pa Rourke, as it was expected that Omaha would at least turn out 3,000.

Denver walked away with the game, but only after a tight battle from start to finish. The score was 2 to 1.

A southward person named Mitchell was largely responsible for the reputation of our forces. Mr. Mitchell's slants were of the par excellence variety and he checked Krug's men with four hits, all of them singles.

Ingersoll Heaves Good Game

On the other hand, Bob Ingersoll, he of the famous dollar movement, chucked a pretty good game for the Rockies, but it was not up to the standard set by Mitchell. 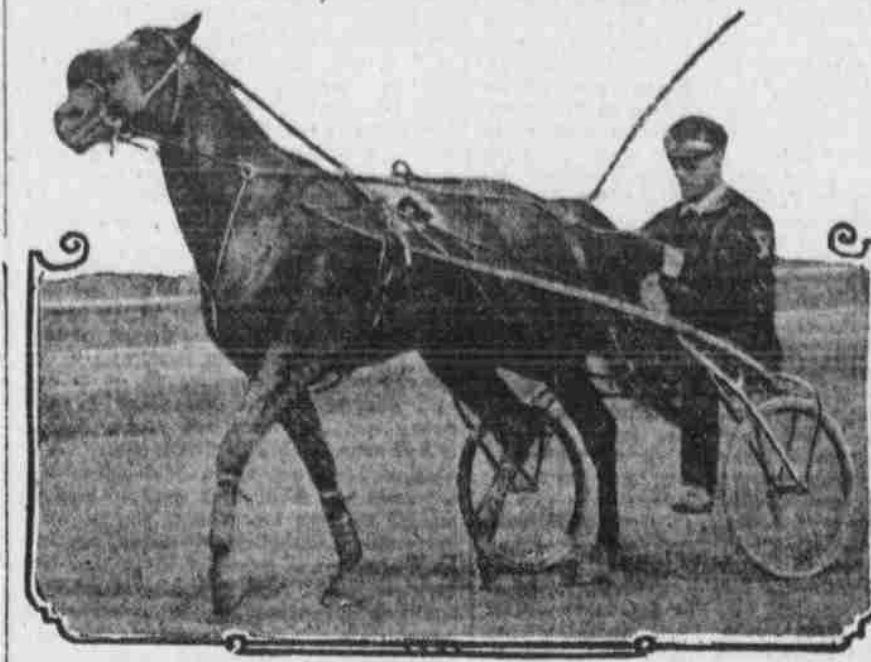
Lost Game of Eleven Innings to Wichita

SHADELINE FIRST IN TWO-TWELVE PACE

District Judge Sears' Little Chestnut Pacing Stallion Outraces and Outgames Field.

FAST TIME ADDS TO LAURELS

Shadeline, District Judge Sears' chestnut pacing stallion, yesterday raced into submission a field of eight other veteran race horses, when he won the 2:12 pace, a four-heat contest, at the Speedway.

The slender, little fellow out-spedded, outraced and finally out-gamed his competitors. He gave them their choice of racing in front of him, behind him or at his necktie and beat them to the wire with a little left. Himself a free-legged pacer, he contested against six hopped horses and raced as steadily as any of them.

To add to his laurels, the little gamecock stepped the first mile of the race in 2:15, the fastest of the first two days of the Omaha Driving club's meeting. It must be figured as equivalent to 2:19 or better when the condition of the track and the time made on it by all the other horses which have started are considered. He came back the fourth heat in 2:17, eased up at the wire.
